Dock defibrillators, outstation railings & enjoy QCYC events

The instructions for use are well illustrated on the device, but you should have 911 on the phone with you if you think you need to use one.

The railing for the outstation deck is finally installed. That's a real safety issue averted! The new deck was a long time in coming, but it should last us for another 20+ years of parties on the deck. I'll try to be at all of them, because PARTY!

If you need to get your boat electrically tested this summer to stay in compliance with club rules, reach out to me or any of the members of the Vessel Electrical Safety Committee (VESC) and we will accommodate you. Also look for frequent email announcements and on the club calendar for monthly testing schedules. The water around our marinas is MUCH safer thanks to this effort.

The end of June also marked the end of most Covid restrictions for WA. What a crazy 1.5 years of living under the oppression of a killer virus. And I don't think we're done

with it just yet, but I really hope the summer brings us even more openness, especially at the Canadian border.

I'm eager to see a lot of QCYC members out on boats this summer; on July 4th weekend at the outstation, or on our Summer Cruise down south, maybe at Andrews Bay a few times, or just out cruising around. It's my last summer on the Bridge, and I intend to make it a meaningful cruising season.

The term "Pride of Queen City" is traditionally associated with a time to spruce up the clubhouse and grounds in preparation for Opening Day, but it also is a time to get our own boats in order and spiffed up for the upcoming cruising season. Covid-19 pulled a whopper on many of us and the regular routine of washing, and brightening our boats got waylaid. Now that we have been blessed with vaccinations, we expect that all vessels in the marina will soon be "squeaky

This is also time to remind members that Washington State Vessel Registration certification and insurance documents need to be submitted to the office in a timely manner. It is each member's responsibility to provide the required documentation to the office so no further volunteer manhours need to be spent tracking down the information. The Bridge and office staff truly appreciate your attention to taking care of these requirements in a timely manner.

The Board of Trustees adopted a Social Media Policy at a special meeting June 21st. Please look for it on the website. Our members have been responsible and respectful on the QCYC Forum and Facebook pages, so this is simply a formal acknowledgment of expectations already in practice.

In the recent past the rules for transient, temporary, moorage at the club have been interpreted incorrectly. Rule 5.02 as published in the annual and on the website is the standard that must be followed from now on. The reciprocal dock is reserved for guests from other yacht clubs with whom we have agreements. A Bridge Officer may allow members occasional use of part of the space, but it must be monitored on an ongoing basis and rafting is mandatory. Please see the Rule 5.02 summary box elsewhere in this edition of the Bilge Pump.

Dave and I are looking forward to the Big Brother and July 4th Cruises right around the corner. We will enjoy visiting with many of you there. Best wishes to you all as you find your own special cruising itinerary. Stay safe and return to your home port refreshed and satisfied.

Social Media Policy

On June 21, 2021 the following policy was voted on and approved by Queen City Yacht Club Board of Trustees.

The use of any Queen City Yacht Club social media, including its website, is a limited privilege afforded to members of Queen City Yacht Club only, for the purpose of communicating a positive boating experience in a manner consistent with the membership oath taken at induction into the Club. Postings are to be respectful, and devoid of politics, religion, hate-speech, or other potentially offensive material. Members are expected to refrain in their postings from materials which might bring reproach upon the Club, its members, or its burgee. Members posting on this site do so with the understanding that any post deemed to violate this general guidance is subject to removal at the discretion of the Bridge, irrespective of whether it is or would be deemed acceptable by social media. The Commodore may order restriction of use, including prohibition, or other measures deemed appropriate to the level to which a member has exceeded that guidance.

Temporary Moorage Rule Refresher

It is important that members follow the temporary moorage rule as published on the web site and in the annual.

Four points of clarity for temporary moorage in the Mainstation U or Reciprocal. These are long-standing QCYC Rules from 5.02:

1.) Per QCYC Rule 5.02, ANY member who desires to moor on the Reciprocal dock MUST first obtain permission from a Bridge Officer.
2.) Online registration is required for overnight moorage in the U or Reciprocal. There is an \$8 fee per night for overnight moorage in the U, Reciprocal, or the Outstation.

3.) ONLY non-mooring members (Those who do not have permanent moorage at the Mainstation) are eligible for an additional 7 days on the Reciprocal dock, and ONLY with permission from a Bridge Officer. The member must participate in a Club event during the stay.

4.) Days allowed at the Mainstation:
----Mooring Members = 7 Days in a 30 day period.
----Non-mooring Members = 7 Days in the U & 7 Days on the Reciprocal (With Bridge Officer permission) and must participate in a Club event during the stay.

your Oath of Membership: 'I promise to never bring reproach or dishonor upon the Queen City Yacht Club Burgee.' For those who are unaware, Queen City has Cruising Rules¹ which most Mariners already follow:

- Take your turn in line at the locks.
- Proceed dead slow through anchorage or moorings.
- Minimize noise where other boats are anchored or at settled beach (use loudspeaker sparingly).
- Do not run outboards or generators late at night in a crowded anchorage.
- Do not throw refuse or garbage overboard.
- Adhere to speed limits and harbor rules.
- Respect the rights of the other person, afloat or ashore.
- Conduct yourself afloat so as not to discredit your burgee.

Make sure this summer when you are out cruising and spot another boat flying the QCYC Burgee at the docks, that you take a moment to stop and say 'Hello.' Many a great QCYC friendships have started this way. And

the general membership meeting when visiting with non-QCYC boaters on the docks or in the locks, be sure to mention QCYC membership and the reasons you chose to join. A personal recommendation is the best way to recruit new members.

Finally, while you are out enjoying your cruise this summer, please restrict your parking to one vehicle per membership at the QCYC mainstation parking lot. During this period of restrictive parking, you must display your QCYC 2021 parking placard on your vehicle. Restricted parking at Queen City goes through September 15th. Please also be careful when parking to only take up one parking space, and do not leave any valuables in your vehicle.

Peter Gulick (1930-2121), husband, and devoted father of three, passed away quietly on Saturday April 24th with family at his side. A man of few words, strong in character, who remained steadfast to those he loved throughout his life. Peter was member #81 when he crossed the bar for the last time at age ninety one.

Peter's children Chris, Sara and Scott have lovingly written a wonderful eulogy for their father:

"Pete graduated from Princeton in 1952. He attended Stanford Law School and

transferred to the University of Washington Law School to complete his Juris Doctor in 1956. He began his career at Foster, Pepper & Riviera and became a partner in the firm. He followed his dream to start his sole law practice in Bellevue from 1979 until his retirement. Pete specialized in Real Estate contracts, General Corporate Law and in his semi-retirement he continued pro bono work for those in need in the community.

Pete was devoted to his family and community. His family lived in the Lake Heights neighborhood on the eastside starting in 1957. A man of many familyoriented hobbies, he loved boating, salmon fishing, freshwater fly fishing and extended hiking & camping trips throughout the Pacific Northwest in the summertime. Pete enjoyed training and pheasant hunting with dogs Reggie and champion show dog Darby. In Pete's retirement years he was a member of the United Northwest Model Train Club, building his own miniature landscape track sections and participating in local train shows. He also enjoyed Civil War history and creating landscape watercolor paintings. As the eastside community grew, he was very active in the development of the community serving as president of the Lake

Heights Community Club, local water & sewer districts, Newport Hills youth soccer, Scoutmaster for Troop 433, a life member of the Queen City Yacht Club and active in the American Power Boat Association as an accomplished predicted log racer."

Captain Gulick joined Queen City YC in 1985 and immediately became an active log racer and our Regatta Power Chair in 1986, a position he held for several years. In addition, he was our representative to the International Power Boat Association (IPBA) and continued as the IPBA Treasurer until 2013.

Peter served on our By Laws Committee a number of times in the early 90s making good use of his attorney's knowledge of how bylaws should be structured. He had a distinct personality, extremely bright, good sense of humor and was well liked by members that knew him.

While a member, he owned a 28' Uniflite named "Retreat."

Peter is survived by his former wife Kathryn of 32 years, and his children Chris (Linda), Sarah (Guy) and Scott (Nancy) who will forever be grateful for instilling his wisdom and guidance in their lives, he shall always be deeply missed.

After graduation, he joined Boeing for a couple of years as a draftsman before attending the UW, graduating in Business Administration. It was here that Gary developed a life-long avid love of all things UW especially as a Husky football fan - an almost 50-year season ticket holder!

He met the love of his life, Barbara, at UW through a fraternity-sorority exchange and they enjoyed an almost 58-year incredible marriage. Although they didn't have children of their own, they "adopted family" like Peter & niece Kathleen Anderson and their daughter Katieanne. Growing up, Katianne knew Gary as Uncle Gary and Barbara as Auntie Barbara. Others, including several club members, thought of Gary as

a father figure always being available for advice and as a sounding board.

impressive list of serving and contributions to our club. Over the years, he was chair of a 4th of July weekend at Winslow, Sweetheart Dinners, Legislative committee for several years, Entertainment chair, nominating committee, three years on the Board of Trustees (Chair in 2006) and five years on the Planning & Finance committee. While on P&F, Gary was instrumental in starting the process to completely renovate our docks' electrical system and provided leadership in financial plans going forward keeping us financially strong through both good and lean years.

Captain Stone was our point man with the state and neighborhood groups for the new 520 bridge development serving as Chair of our 520 Bridge Committee for many years. He coordinated and brokered many agreements with the State, Montlake neighborhood and Roanoke neighborhood working groups, Seattle Yacht Club, and UW for recommendations to the Washington State Transportation Department's bridge design.

Gary was awarded the Commodore's Trophy in 2007 and named Member of the Year in 2011!

Along with Gary's committee and governance positions, he is fondly
