NEW WiFi SYSTEM COMES TO THE MAINSTATION

Thanks to Captain Greg Burgess, we have WiFi system at the outstation, and he is in the process of installing a new distributed WiFi system at the Mainstation. The new system will incorporate more than 20 WiFi Access Points distributed within the main building and on each of the docks.

Key Improvements:

- All WiFi access points will be hard wired via Category 6 Ethernet cable to the network.
- This allows for up to 1 Gbps connection between the access points and the network equipment in the building's backroom.
- A single network name to connect to. No longer will it be necessary to manually select a WiFi network name based on where you are located on the site.
- Automatic roaming between

Docks Doin's

HOW TO PROPERLY 'KILL' MOLD & SLIME ON OUR DOCK PLANKS WITHOUT PRESSURE WASHING

Avast, ye Pressurewashers!
For, lo the winter has (more or less) passed

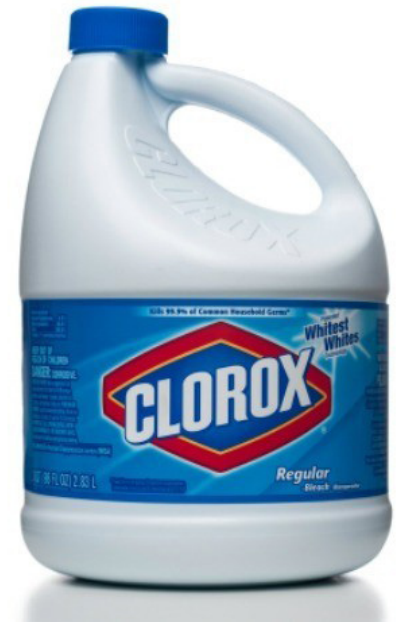
The rain is over and done
(well, at least a little warmer)

The flowers appear on the earth

The time of slip sliding is come
And the roar of the pressure washer is heard on the docks.



Got green slime and mold on your dock planks? Does this make the surface a little slippery when wet? Hey, no problem, right? Just



drag that pressure washer out of your backyard tool shed, haul it down to the club, and blast the livin' stink out of everything in sight. Hooray! Bye-bye slime! Doin' the club a favor, right?

Please don't do that. Please.

The same high pressure spray that temporarily removes the mold and slime from you dock damages the underlying planks as well. A pressure washer literally blows the "pith" out from between the more durable portions of the grain. The grooved surface then collects *more* water, accelerating future fungus and rot. Last winter, the Docks Committee replaced several planks damaged by well-intentioned members blasting the pith out of their docks.

Good news! You don't have to put up with the mold and slime. You can kill it, and then rinse it away with a gentle, garden nozzle stream that won't damage the dock planks.

To kill mold and slime:

1. Create a solution of bleach and water. Two gallons of bleach,

and two gallons of water, should be sufficient for a single finger pier.

2. Mop down the dock planks.

3. Allow the dock to remain "wet" under the bleach and water solution long enough to kill the fungi. (That's the fungi on the dock, not the "fun guy" member on the opposite side of your finger pier)

4. Rinse thoroughly, using no more pressure than produced by a regular garden nozzle.

A friendly reminder for old timers, and maybe a first notice to newly moored members; no potted plants on the docks (fertilizer, water, and dirt promote rot spores). No "Welcome" mats with solid rubber, unventilated backings (water gets trapped below the mat and doesn't get a chance to dry out).

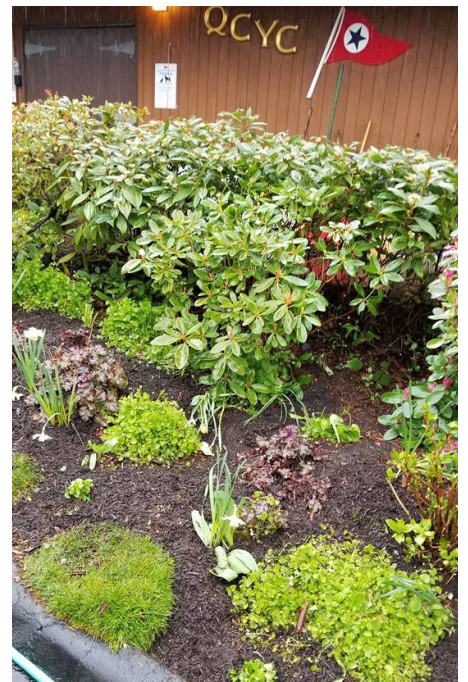

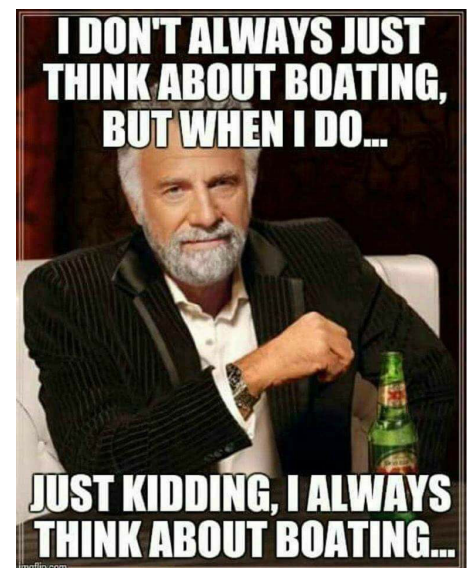

QCYC HISTORY

QCYC EARLY FREMONT ROOTS REFLECT NEW BRIDGE, BACK IN THE DAY

Fremont. Queen City Yacht Club has been located on Portage Bay since before most of our current members were born. But if we look back at our earliest days, we must acknowledge that our club began in Fremont. Our first meetings occurred at Fremont Hall, before we built a short-lived clubhouse on Salmon Bay.

The first photo in this series shows a view into Fremont, looking north across an old wooden bridge. That photo is from 1915, a year prior to QCYC's founding. Of special note in that photo is the building on the right. In later years, that grocery store became the headquarters of Wilson Marine- owned by life member Joie Roehl and her late husband Denny.

The second photo depicts the construction of the current Fremont bridge, in 1916. It's likely this project was underway while our founders met nearby.

Workers shown in the final photo are using bricks to pave the roadway approaching the new bridge, in 1917.

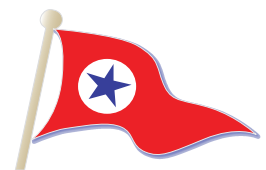

NEW WIFI

WiFi access points as a device moves around the site.

- Automatic load balancing of available bandwidth between devices on the network.

Timeline:

March 2018:

Initial controller hardware and WiFi access points have been installed within the building. New network named "QCYC - Members" is available for use within the building. Same passwords as previous network.

April 2018:

- Wired network controller boxes will be mounted behind each dock gate.

- Outdoor WiFi access point will be installed to cover the "U" to support opening day festivities. This device will be mounted on the northwest corner of Dock 3.

- Web Cameras on Dock 3 will be directly connected to the new wired network.

- WiFi access points will be installed on Dock 3.

May 2018:

- Dock 2 will have Ethernet cables run the length on the dock.

- WiFi access points will be installed on Dock 2.

June 2018:

- Dock 1 will have Ethernet cables run the length of the dock.

- WiFi access points will be installed on Dock 1.

July 2018:

Old WiFi network will be decommissioned. What this means now:

- Members are encouraged to use the new network QCYC-Members when in the building and as docks come online.

- The existing network will not be turned off until the next system is fully installed.

- There may be minor (several hour) interruptions to WiFi service as we install hardware.

What can you do to help?

We will install wire on various weekends through the month of June. If you would like to help, contact me, Greg Burgess, at gregburg@gmail.com Thank you,

TECHNOLOGY ON THE MOVE

ONLINE SIGN-IN READIES FOR MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

When you arrive at the Bainbridge Outstation this summer for fun and all of our great club events, you will find a new and improved electronic sign-in process. Now you will be able to sign-in for your stay (and/or a load of laundry) from a tablet computer that will be attached to the desk where the log-in book is now located, or if you so choose, even from the comfort of your own boat with your own computer, iPad or smartphone.

Just like today, you will be able to see your entry as well as the others who are at the outstation, and this information can only be seen by Queen City members. Our amazing web team has re-created the sign-in book to be online through the Queen City website.

Just a few clicks and you are signed-in. It is really easy and don't worry, there will be Bridge Officers and Outstation Hosts to help you if needed, and as always, Elise is just a phone call away to lend a hand. The objective of this project is to reduce the number of billing mistakes due to current system, to allow better efficiency in back office process and

to reduce expenses.

NEW RULE BANS VESSELS FROM RELEASING SEWAGE INTO PUGET SOUND

State officials say marine sanitation devices commonly used by vessels don't adequately treat sewage.

So boaters will need to pump out toilet waste at stationary or mobile pump-out facilities, hold waste in tanks, or wait until they are out of the zone.

The state petitioned the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for the zone designation, which the agency affirmed in 2017.

The new rule does not apply to so-called graywater that drains from sinks or baths. Tugboats, commercial fishing vessels, federal research vessels and some others would have until 2023 to comply.

Currently, boaters are allowed to pump out treated sewage anywhere in Puget Sound. Federal law allows vessels to dump raw sewage only in waters more than 3 miles from the coast.

A number of environmental

groups supported the "no discharge zone" as a step toward protecting Puget Sound.

"This is long awaited and a lot of work has gone into this," said Chris Wilke of the Puget Soundkeeper Alliance. "It's a significant day for Puget Sound."

Critics have worried that the rule is too broad and would be costly for many who would have to retrofit vessels to accommodate waste holding tanks.

Retrofits for tug boats and commercial vessels could range from negligible cost to \$161,000, according to a consultant for the department. Adding a holding tank on a recreational boat is estimated to be about \$1,500.

Some who opposed the zone in comments to the Environmental Protection Agency said the state should pay more attention to larger issues of



pollution from stormwater, failed septic systems and other issues.

Others said the retrofit costs would create economic hardships particularly for those who rely on their vessels to make a living. Still others worried whether there were enough pump-out facilities for a range of vessels.

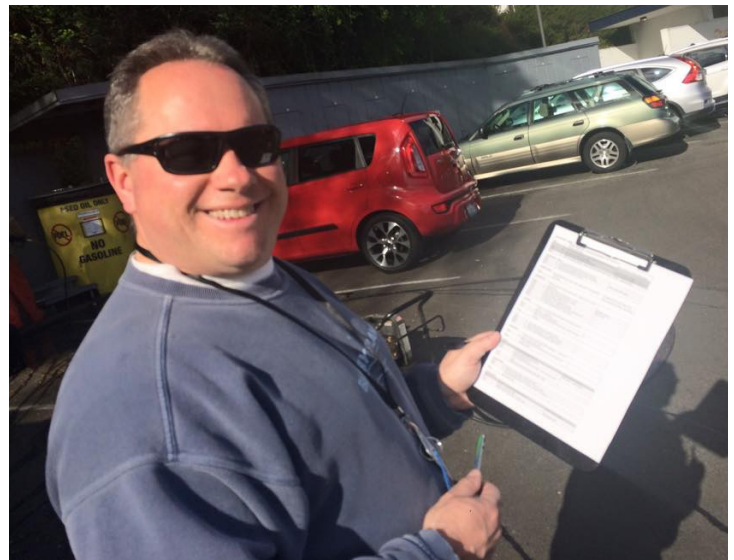
The agency said there are more than 173 pump-out stations for recreational boaters, and another 16 commercial pump-outs. It is working with others to add more commercial pumpouts.

PRIDE OF QUEEN CITY

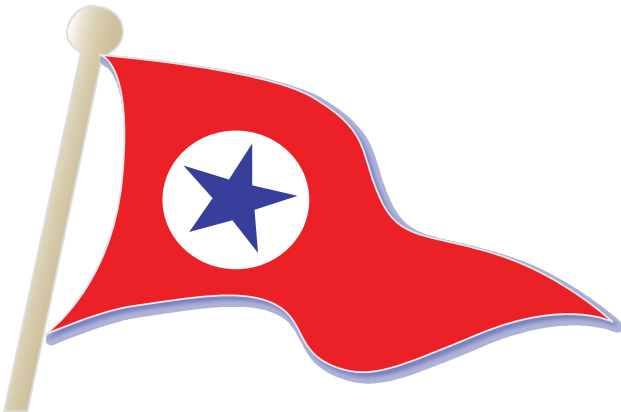
