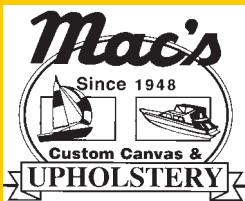
Coming soon: Who is J.W. Lough and why should I ask him questions?

FROM NERF BALLS TO BOAT BUNCO

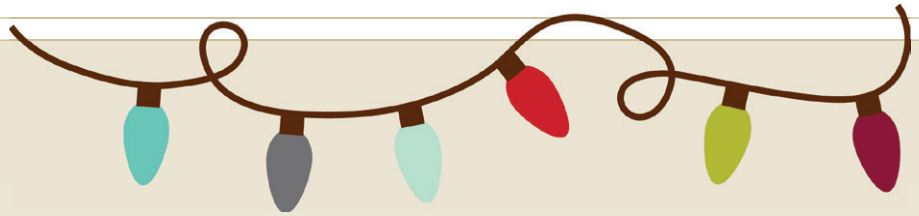

THE CENTENNIAL CORNER

REMEMBER WHEN?

The headline in November, 1959 might have been: “Queen City goes (sort of) modern.”

Club members voted that month to amend the QCYC Articles of Association, increasing the maximum number of active members to 400, restricting membership to boat owners, and confirming that women need not apply.

“The membership of this corporation shall consist of Active, Active Life Membership, and Honorary male members only,” the amendment stated.

The first women didn't gain full membership until 1985.

Before 1959, some people who did not own a boat joined the club for social purposes. The amendment made boat ownership a requirement for regular membership.

The amendment created two paths to Life Membership.

Then, as now, a member would be considered for Life Membership after paying dues for 25 years. But it was also possible to buy your way in. Applicants for “Life Membership” were able to attain that status by writing a check to the club for an amount equal to 15 years' dues.

We still have a maximum number of 400 active members, and women are considered equal members with men.

We may not currently have any Service Members on the QCYC roster, but that classification was already in place in 1959. This class of membership allows QCYC members on active duty in the military to enjoy most of the privileges of membership without paying dues.

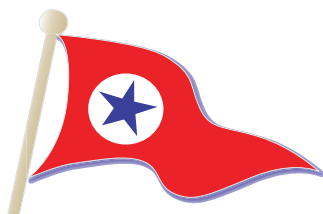

WILLIAM PARSONS BRINTNALL FIELD, II

1939 – 2016

Captain Bill Field was remembered at Queen City last month as a notable member of Seattle's boating community, a scholar and a gentleman.

Bill was born May 2, 1939 in Needham, Massachusetts and graduated from Needham High School before attending Yale University and becoming a member of Mensa, the high-IQ society. He died in August at age 77.

After graduating from Yale and marrying that June, Bill joined the Navy -- the family says he always told them he joined in order to avoid being drafted into the Army. After graduating from officer-training, he was stationed in Long Beach, California on the cruiser *USS Fechteler*. After his Navy discharge, he went to work as a stocks-and-bonds trader at his father-in-law's Memphis investment firm.

In civilian life, Bill continued his investment career as a branch manager for Charles Schwab and certified public accountant. After moving to Seattle, he was an accountant and auditor for the State of Washington.

Bill is remembered by friends for his sense of humor and generosity with his time as a volunteer, as well as being the perfect gentleman and meticulous writer.

Nadeane Rutledge, a longtime friend, remembered Bill from his work in the Power Squadron, which he

joined in 1978 in Memphis, becoming a life member. He was a past commander of the Memphis squadron and commander in Seattle in 1998 and 2000.

"There were many, many more tasks that Bill volunteered for that bore no official titles," Nadeane wrote. "Not a year went by that Bill wasn't on at least one committee. And most of the time he was chairing it!"

Karin McLean, a longtime friend, has similar memories of Bill's involvement in Power Squadron and adds that he seemed to always be in charge of meeting night, setting up the tables, lectern and bar. "Bill loved (power squadron) and all of his activities in it," she said.

Captain Field joined QCYC in 2003 and was awarded the commodore's trophy for his dedication and service to the club. He edited *The Bilge Pump* newsletter from 2009 until his death, chaired the Special People's cruise committee for eight years and was ticket chair for countless club events.

Captain Field is survived by his children, Susan Crutcher of Little Rock, Arkansas, and William P.B. (Brint) Field of Snohomish; brother, Blake E. Field of Leesville, South Carolina, and grandchildren, Blake F. Crutcher, William B. Field and Tanner P. Field.

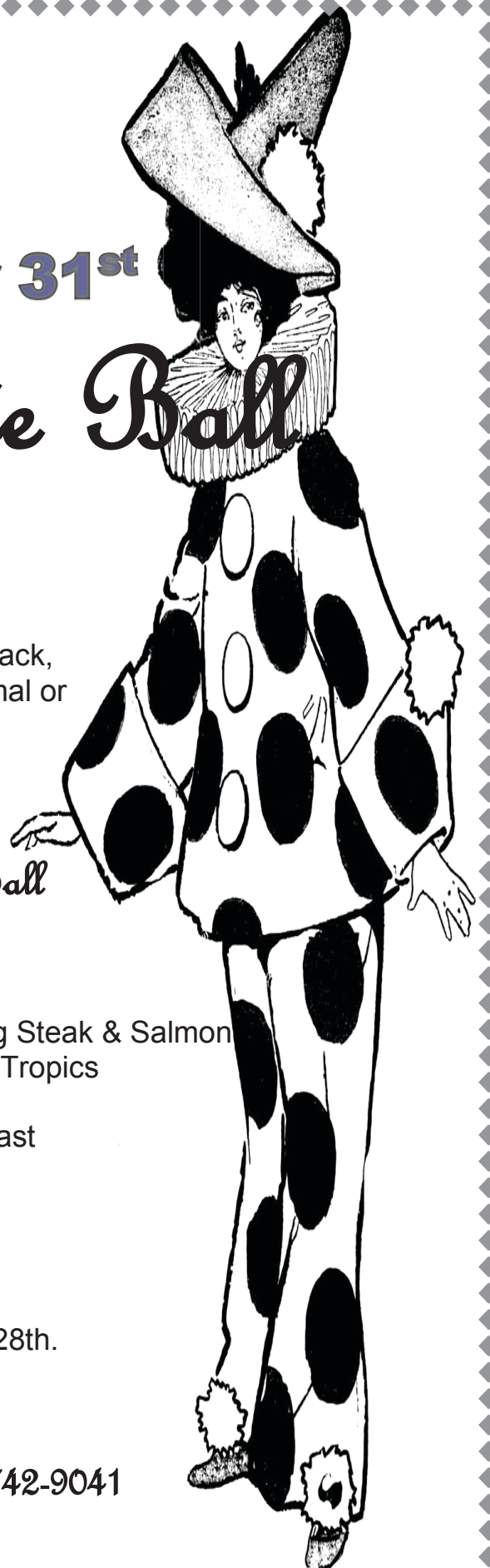
