

# PLEASE FOLLOW PARKING LOT RULES



Long time and well liked member Captain Bill Cleaver, #038, peacefully slipped his moorage for the last time on May 14th at the age of 75. His final days were spent with his family by his side at his home in Mukilteo.

Bill was born Sep 16, 1943 in Seattle where he grew up and attended Roosevelt High School then entered and graduated from Edison Tech, Seattle's nationally top-rated vocational school. Bill started working at Bellevue Vacuum and then in 1970 became the proud owner! The shop developed a large customer base due to Bill's ability to repair almost any vacuum cleaner and Sandi's business acumen and was a Bellevue fixture until 2017 when Bill & Sandi retired and closed the shop.

Bill had three children by a previous marriage; son John, and daughters Paulette and Tricia. Bill and Sandi were married in 1979 and were pretty much inseparable until Bill passed as a result of

Bill joined Queen City in 1976 sponsored by his dad, Herb Cleaver, who owned the "Marion II" the well-known 42' 1929 Lake Union Dreamboat. Bill and Sandi became very active members attending club social events and were a popular couple. Bill served as Wine Steward several years and also on the Security Committee. He was chair of the 1979 Memorial Day Cruise and loaned his convertible for 4th of July Winslow parades. After the Cleaver's bought the beautiful "Wildlife", a 65' International Offshore, they would use it for the QCYC officer's boat in the Opening Day parades and Bill would often host the Old Timers Night cruises on it.

In 1980, Commodore John Clark named Bill as Man of the Year!

The Cleavers owned two boats while members; the "Tolyaso" a 40' Universal Marine trawler and the aforementioned "Wildlife".

Bill is survived by his wife Sandi, daughters Paulette and Tricia, granddaughters Lauren (Alex), Nicole and Kelly, his sister Alice and brother John (also a QCYC member). He is dearly missed by all who knew and loved him.













# KEN SHIELDS: PILOT ON LAND & SEA PASSES

**Ken Shields** 

1924 - 2019

Our number 001 member, Ken Shields, crossed the bar on August 3, at the age of 95. Ken's story, has been affectionately written by Larry & Rheta Downs as follows:

"Ken was born January 9, 1924 in Bellingham but grew up in Seattle. Ken was the third of four boys. Backed by a strong work ethic, Ken sold lilacs door to door to neighbors at a very early age. Sometimes wondering if the buyers knew the lilacs came from their own flower beds. He had a paper route and sold magazines door to door to earn money to help his mom put food on the table. In 1940 at the age of 16 Ken went to visit his older brother in San Francisco. He found a dishwashing job and never returned home.

In 1941 he returned to Seattle and got a job working for Preston Smith, a long time QCYC member at the Five Point Café and Mecca Café. He took odd jobs in California and Arizona over the next few years. He had worked in 13 different jobs by the age of 19. Ken never had difficulty finding work. One of his tactics was to offer to work for free for a day. If at the end of the day the boss didn't think Ken would work out, both parties could go their separate ways. Needless to say, the bosses never turned Ken away.

In 1943 at the age of 18 Ken joined the Merchant Marine and from 1943 to 1945 Ken saw the world. Onboard was a utility man, cabin steward, waiter, cook and baker. He visited New Guinea, the Admiralty Islands, Chile, Pearl Harbor, Panama Canal, Tasmania, Australia, Ceylon, Alaska, Hawaii and New York.

1948 saw Ken in Alaska at Fort Richardson as a cook. From there back to Seattle where he worked at the Doghouse Restaurant for a year. In 1949 Ken and brother Jack opened their first restaurant "The Steakhouse" in downtown Seattle followed

by the "Topper". Ken was 25 at the time.

In 1951 Ken bought a 1946 Cessna 140 from a Seattle pimp and good bar customer at the restaurant. In 1953 Ken and his brother Jack closed the Topper and opened "Jacken's" at 85th and Greenwood. The business dissolved in 1960. Ken shared the story of how he and brother Jack had loaned a restaurant customer \$5000 to open his own car lot at 83rd and Aurora. That proved a successful investment as they got their money back plus \$10,000! The customer was Roy Robinson who now owns several new car dealerships in the Seattle area.

Ken met Donna Walters in 1951 at his restaurant and married in 1960. Every month for the next 11 months Ken gave Donna an anniversary gift. Needless to say Donna was enchanted. Donna's monthly anniversary gift enchantment ended on their 1 year anniversary. No gift! When Donna asked Ken why, he responded "it's been a year - buy what you want!"

Ken joined QCYC in 1955 when he was 31 years old. Ken owned several boats, a 27' Grandy, a 34' Chris Craft called "Honeymoon", a 1926 Dreamboat called "Ann Saunders", a 42' Owens Flagship called "Dawn" and finally their beloved 52' Monk/McQueen called "Topaz". Ken was member #1 from 2016 through 2019.

There is a funny story about the Chris Craft purchase. Ken and a good friend hatched a plan to buy 2 new Chris Crafts direct from the factory by saying they were buying them for a non-existent charter business in Alaska. The boats were shipped by rail from Holland Michigan and were to be delivered to Bryant Marina in Lake Union. That was the same marina the Chris Craft Dealer was based in. Knowing the Chris Craft dealer would not be happy the sale did not go through them, Ken found a dock worker on Harbor Island who plucked the boats off the train before it got to Lake Union for \$20.

In 1957 Ken shipped his 1951 Harley Davidson to Hawaii where he spent 3½ weeks riding his Harley and having a ball. In 1958 Ken visited the Harley Dealer in Seattle and bought a new 1959 74 cubic inch Harley Hydro Glide. The Dealer told Ken to bring the bike back after 500 miles for an oil change. Imagine the look on the Harley owner's face when he opened the store the next morning to find Ken waiting for him. He had ridden the bike all night long to Bellingham, Mount Rainier, down to Portland making various stops to visit friends and drinking lots of coffee and returned to the dealership with 500 miles put

on the bike.

Ken and Donna built a house on Rolling Bay on Bainbridge Island. It was a beautiful house facing downtown Seattle. Ken and Donna were Teamsters driving trucks and Harley "side hacks" in Seattle for a number of companies including the Seattle Times. Ken and Donna often commuted by ferry on their Harleys.

Fellow QCYC member Al Teel showed Ken and Donna a photo ad of the "Topaz", a 52' Monk boat in 1977. After several failed attempts to buy the boat they were finally able to buy her in 1979. That was preceded by Topaz just about sinking during the sea trial in Long Beach, CA. Topaz had sat so long that the planks on the stem above the waterline had shrunk and opened up the seams. When the boat was underway, water poured through the gaps. It didn't help that the bilge pump was wired incorrectly. Fortunately they made it safely back to the marina and an awaiting travel lift to get repairs. Ken and Donna lived aboard for 23 years until Donna's health declined in 2001 when handling the boat became difficult. They bought a house in Sedro Woolley and then sold their beloved "Topaz".

Ken and Donna's love of Harleys continued in Sedro Woolley. They had their Hobby House behind the main house outfitted with a garage door and ramp so they could drive their Harleys inside. Their "Harley Hangar" became one of their favorite meeting places with friends. At ages 88 and 85, Ken and Donna brought Harley Davidson Motorcycles back into their lives. After multiple trade ups, Ken ended up with a 2010 Harley CVO convertible and Donna had a 2010 Harley Tri Glide. Their bikes were finally sold in June 2018.


Ken was a voracious reader and just a little opinionated. He told me he did not believe something if he read about it once. But if he read it twice, he believed it. So what if the majority of what he read was written from the far right! Ken once told me that "sometimes I just say whatever comes out of my mouth." On one of our more recent trips up to visit Ken, Rheta was paying bills, when out of the blue Ken says "did you know that men sometimes pay women for sex?" Not knowing exactly where this was going (There was a box of Viagra on his night stand) Rheta said yes. Ken said "I think I would like to pay a woman for companionship. Ken has now joined his partner in life Donna.

Donna died on November 10, 2018 at the age of 91 while Ken died at home in Sedro Woolley." Lives well lived. RIP."

- Northwest African American Museum, Lunch at Ezell's where Oprah gets her fried chicken!


